Background

- Against a well-established background of Cathedral Studies, great interest in exploring and mapping the characteristics and motivations of cathedral visitors
- Exploring the reach of cathedrals through different and innovative events and installations
 - Examine, listen to and learn from the thoughts and reflections of such visitors

Motivation and Research Question

- No systematic research examining visitor characteristics for such Cathedral events with a scientific theme
- Focus on installation (18-27 Feb 2022)
 entitled "Space, the Universe and
 Everything"; A Light and Sound show
 created by Luxmuralis, drawing on skills of
 modern sculpture artist Peter Walker
 with sound composed by David Harper

Methods

- During online booking for tickets, people were invited to give assent to receiving a follow-up survey from the cathedral team to assess their experience
- Invitation emailed out six months after the installation



Instrument

- Qualtrics Platform
- Link emailed out using the contact list released by Ticket Quarter; sent out via the Diocesan Comms team (so all responses were completely anonymous to the researchers)
- Three sections
 - Section I demographics and background
 - \circ Section 2 57 Likert items, 5 point scale (SA SD); exploring
 - self-assessed religiosity,
 - · intrinsic religious motivation,
 - quest religious orientation,
 - experiencing the cathedral,
 - perceived impact on well-being and
 - views on connection between science and religion
 - Section 3 The Francis Psychological Type Scales; assessing orientations, perceiving functions, judging functions and attitudes
 - Closing section open invitation for free-text comments



Analysis and presentation here

- This presentation addresses just sections I and 2; and some of the qualitative responses, especially those specifically related to the connection between science and religion
- 2481 email recipients
 - 1213 (48.9%) opened the emails
 - 302 (12.2%) clicked through
 - 283 completed responses for this analysis...an effective response rate of 11.4%

Results – Free-text Comments

- Six broad themes identified included in the richness of the responses....
 - Distinctive effectiveness of the installation
 - 2. Cathedral Serving the Local Community
 - 3. Beneficial Psychological Impact of their visit to the installation
 - Resourcing the Spirituality of the visitors/those describing themselves as spiritual but not religious
 - People who clearly identified as atheist/nonreligious, yet applauded access to the magnificent building
 - 6. Installation resourced faith of visitors who aligned themselves with Christian tradition



Distinctive effectiveness of the installation

We had been to the cathedral before and we were really surprised by how affective the 'Space' show was, and how well it worked in a church setting. A very good, enjoyable evening. (male aged 50-59)

I think events such as The World globe and Space are fantastic showcased by the cathedral. We anticipate coming to more events like these. (female aged 50-55)

The cathedral is a magnificent and spiritual space which I always enjoy visiting particularly for the exhibitions/installations. It was wonderful to experience the awe with which the 'Universe' was received and how all the different ages and cultures absorbed the energies created therein. The atmosphere was electric and dazzling and we spent two full hours soaking this in. (female aged 60-69)



Cathedral Serving the Local Community

A memorable experience enjoyed by many. The space event brought many people, including my family, into the cathedral who wouldn't normally visit a place of worship. I like that many churches etc are inviting the community through their doors in new ways. The faith sector has a massive part to play in community and things such as this should be used to increase that access. Thank you. (female aged 70-79)

I visited Space with my parents, sister and nephew and we all enjoyed it very much. Parts were incredible!! Thank you for bringing the event to Liverpool Cathedral. (female aged 40-49)

The experience was uplifting and interesting. I enjoyed seeing families visiting together, people standing, sitting and lying down, listening and watching - contemplating. The atmosphere was vibrant and reflective at the same time. I love the idea that a sacred, religious space was welcoming all the community in an open and non judgemental way. I believe this does more to open minds and evangelise more than any preaching. (female aged 50-59)



Beneficial Psychological Impact of their visit to the installation

Every time we visit, I feel welcomed and comfort. The building is magnificent and the exhibitions truly inspiring. As I walk around the building I feel a sense of quiet calm and reflection. It is a place I will never tire of visiting. (female aged 30-39)

I found the whole experience awe inspiring! The cathedral, well what an amazing building and I definitely felt a sense of peace during the time I spent there. I sort of lost myself in the wonderful atmosphere and can't wait to return to experience future exhibitions, and enjoy this wonderful building. (female aged 50-59)



 Resourcing the Spirituality of the visitors/those describing themselves as spiritual but not religious

I am a spiritual person who prefers meditation to church going. But I <u>love</u> the events that take place in the cathedral and I am filled with joy when entering. The light and sound event you spoke of was by far the most beautiful event I have ever been to. It sent me into a state of bliss. I was sitting on the floor meditating filled with pure joy. The mixture of sound and light seemed to transport me to another dimension. Please bring it back. (male aged 60-69)

I have been to all the events at the cathedral, the moon, earth etc. The space in the building is perfect for this size of exhibition, however the fact that it is a cathedral does put a different 'feel' to it, I light a candle, I stare at the <u>stained glass</u> windows, the columns... it's not a religious experience but a spiritual one x. (female aged 50-59)

 People who clearly identified as atheist/non-religious, yet applauded access to the magnificent building

I think the cathedral is a beautiful building and have enjoyed the doves and world installations as well as the space one. Although an atheist, I find spiritual comfort from lighting a candle in memory of loved ones. (female aged 70-79)

Not religious at all but love the cathedral and the event itself was simply <u>breathtaking</u> (male aged 50-59)

I really enjoyed the light experience and the cathedral made it a wonderful experience. Although I do not believe in God I do enjoy visiting cathedrals and the Liverpool Anglican Cathedral is my favourite. (female aged 60-69)



 Installation resourced faith of visitors who aligned themselves with Christian tradition

I enjoy visits to the cathedral and feel that it is part of my roots, belonging to Liverpool and my ancestors. I feel church and religion play a big part in my life giving me faith and an anchor. I enjoyed the science evening at the cathedral in fact it was awesome. (female aged 70-79)

I welcome the developing focus on links between science and faith, the head and the heart, the what and the why, the detail and the bigger picture, the present reality and the vision. This is God's world and anything that helps prompt and supports me to serve him and others better is welcomed. (female aged 50-59)



- High proportion expressing commitment to Liverpool Cathedral in some way
 - Importance of place; but also nature of the event
- Religious profile through this sort of event, able to engage with churchgoers and non-churchgoers
 - Cathedrals have capacity to soften boundaries, raise questions
- Positive impact of installation on spiritual well-being
 - Perceived improvement all four Fisher's domains
- Capacity to promote constructive thought connection between science and religion
 - Vast majority in favour of cathedral engaging with science;
 an ideal place for this type of exhibition
 - Need for both science and religion in one's life



Limitations

- Individuals who booked the tickets (not necessarily includes all who attended)
- Time lapse between attendance and conduction of the survey – low response rate
- Single invite to participate
- Lack of sophistication science and religion questions







- Paper
- Conducted another survey following the most recent Peter Walker Son et Lumiere at the Cathedral (Dec 2022)
- Survey again with those who booked tickets
 - Much shorter time lapse
 - Three invitations to participate
 - Less focus on science and religion
